Point State Park, atop the Pittsburgh Golden Triangle, commemorates and preserves the historical heritage of the area during the French and Indian Wars (1754-1763). Along with the story, Point State Park provides a beautiful 36.4-acre recreation center in downtown Pittsburgh with a cobbled waterfront promenade, beautiful views, a 150-foot fountain and a large grassy area. Point State Park is located right at the tip of downtown Pittsburgh, at the point where the Allegheny and Monongahela rivers meet to form the Ohio River. It can be accessed east or west by I-376 and I-279, from the north of PA 8 and south to PA 51. The Bike and Ice Skating Route connects Point State Park with the North Shore Trail, South Side Trail, and Eliza Furnace Trail right across town. Point State Park is free and open to the public, as is the Fort Pitt Museum located in the park. Point State Park is a national historical monument and tells the story of Pittsburgh's key involvement in the French and Indian Wars. Twenty-three monuments, plaques and markers throughout the park in memory of events, people and places of historical significance. If you're not in history, Point State Park also offers a beautiful place to spend the day with a cobbled waterfront circling the river, a huge fountain for cooling and beautifully landscaped grounds made for walks. The French fort dukesne did not give them control of the Ohio Valley until the British Army, led by General John Forbes, arrived in 1758. A number of Frenchmen burned the fort and left. Soon Fort Pitt was under construction at the same site - the most extensive fortification by the British in the American colonies. Fort Pitt had five sides with a bastion (project part) on each side. It is open to the public from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesdays through Saturdays, Sundays from noon to 5 p.m. and closed on Mondays. Entry fee is levied for persons aged 12 and over. Pabradypphoto/Getty Images Fort Pitt Blockhouse in Point State Park, built in 1764 by Colonel Henry Bouquet, is the oldest authentic building in Western Pennsylvania and the only remaining structure of the former Fort Pitt. Jeff Greenberg/Getty Images The 150-foot fountain in Point State Park was dedicated to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania on August 30, 1974. Contrary to popular belief, the water from the fountain comes not from the three rivers of Pittsburgh, but from the 54-foot well down into the underground glacial stream is sometimes referred to as Pittsburgh's fourth river. Three pumps with a capacity of 250 horsepower operate a fountain in Point State Park that contains more than 800,000 gallons of water accented by lights. The circular fountain pool, popular with sunbathers, is 200 feet in diameter. The fountain is open daily from 7:30 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., the weather allows, during the spring, summer and autumn seasons. Thank you for letting us know! On June 27, Central Park, New York's 2.5-mile green zone, will officially go car free. Mayor Bill de Blasio announced the news, saying: This park was not built for cars. It was built for people. In addition to the scenic cliffs and vistas, the park boasts three waterfalls, simply known as the lower, middle and upper waterfalls. The choppy waters are closed for swimming here, but white water rafting and inflatable kayak rides allow visitors to endure lower rapids. More than 60 miles of hiking trails travel through forest areas and lead to all three waterfalls and other scenic observation decks. For an even higher point of view, the balloon rides to give a bird's-eye view. Letchworth offers a wide range of accommodations, including campsites, cabins and several fully equipped cottages. The erosion of limestone and shale has formed striking rock formations and a whopping 19 waterfalls along the two-mile gorge path. The trail includes several stairs and bridges, helping visitors safely pass through a deep gorge and travel beyond several waterfalls. Fog from the waterfall provides a refreshing relief on a summer hike, but can also create slippery conditions in places. Two additional trails trace the upper edge of the gorge, providing exceptional point views. The park includes cabins and campsites, some of which have electrical connections. In addition to the famous Maid of the Mist tour, visitors can get an exceptional view of the waterfall and get a dose of history in Niagara Falls State Park. The park includes an embankment along the Niagara River, as well as a collection of islands connected by bridges between American Falls, Bridal Veil waterfall and a forged waterfall. The largest island, Goat Island, has cobbled trails leading between picturesque viewpoints, including Terrapin Point and Cave of the Winds, a wooden walkway that allows visitors to admire the Wedding Falls below. Parking the nearest falls can be madness and charge a hefty price. Fortunately, there are free garages and places heading into the city. The park's dramatic rock formations and 150-foot spires were formed by glaciers and severe weather conditions in upstate New York. Erosion helped create this stunning landscape, but it has also had a negative impact on the stability of the Bluff Trail, which was closed in 2018 for safety reasons. Since then, the trail has taken tourists to the top of the bluff for spectacular views. After that, the narrow beach is a picturesque place for picnicking and cooling in Lake Ontario. Families with young children should note that there are no guard rails along the rock areas. For either an easy day-hike, the one-mile Awosting Falls Trail leads to a stunning 60-foot waterfall and serene pool below. To stretch your legs further and reach sweeping views on the 22,000-acre park, the Rainbow Falls Trail won't disappoint. Two of the park's pristine lakes - Lake Minnevaska and Lake Awodding - have designated beach areas for swimming. Surrounding rocks and rocky outcrops of Lake Minnevaska can be explored further along the nasal path of Gertrude. There are 50 tent-only campsites nearby at Samuel F. Treman State Park includes a gorge along Enfield Creek with a dozen gushing waterfalls. The lower waterfall is less than half a mile from the parking lot, and have a significant hole to swim below the waterfall. There are nine walking trails through the park. If you only have time for one, hike upstream on the 4.3-mile Rim Trail and Gorge Trail Loop is a must-see stunning view of the gorge and 115-foot Lucifer Falls. If you have time, continuing on the park's upper entrance stands for Old Mill Falls and Enfield Falls, both of which tend to be less crowded. In the Lower Falls area there are tent and RV campsites, as well as small cabins for rent. Continue to 7 out of 11 below. 07 of 11 Located on the east bank of the Hudson River between the charming cities of Lighthouse and Cold Spring, Hudson Highlands State Park is an affordable nature refuge by car or train from Westchester and New York. The steep area is a tourist paradise. The 5.5-mile Breakneck Ridge trail climbs an astounding 1,250 feet in a three-quarter-mile portion at the top. Another route, the Bull Hill Trail, can be completed in a matter of hours and offers views of Mount Storm King. At the north end at Dennings Point, a more leisurely trail takes in views of the waterfront and abandoned brick buildings that are slowly reclaimed by nature. Another abandoned site, Bannerman Castle, can be seen from the Hudson by kayak, canoe or chartered boat. The park takes its name from the stunning Pakhta waterfall, which dips the shale rock into a natural pool where visitors can swim in the summer months. Heading upstream, tourists will encounter numerous smaller waterfalls along the gorge that collectively descend about 600 feet within the park's boundaries. The 4.5-mile loop lake Teman occupies in the park's main attractions, including waterfalls, Pinnacle Rock, the upper edge overlooking the gorge, and the wetland area around Lake Terman. The 5.7-mile Doodletown Bride Way Loop Trail traces historic revolutionary roads past abandoned mining areas, Split Rock Falls, and Doodletown Reservoir with extraordinary views of the Hudson along the way. The ascent to the Perkins Memorial Tower offers sweeping views of the Hudson River Valley. Come winter, Bear Mountain trails are popular with skiers. Staying at the Bear Mountain Inn is ideal for spending a lot of time in the park, although camping is available in nearby Harriman State Park. Continue to 10 of 11 below. 10 of 11 Located all the way to Montauk, Hither Hills State Park features beaches, recreation areas, and affordable camping in the heart of the Hamptons. The Atlantic side has extensive golden sandy beaches with amenities as well as a 190-site campsite. Meanwhile, narrower beaches on the bay can be reached by hiking trails or one driveway. A network of routes through the park are accessible to tourists and riders. The topography of the park is mostly wooded, but the west side has rolling sand dunes along Napeague Harbour. In addition to its size, Alleghani is most distinguished by the abundance of massive boulders and rocks scattered throughout the dense, mature forest. A quick quarter mile Thunder Rocks trail winds through high cliffs, perfect for climbing and exploring hidden alcogs. More trailheads lead from Red Lake House, where there is also a beach for swimming. Kayakers and canoeists can enjoy the calmer waters of the Kwaker Lake or take over the Alleghani River. Accommodation in Allegany covers everything from tented and RV campsites to cabins, yurts, and cottages for rent.
